The manger becomes a sign of hope, reminding us that light can shine even in the darkest places.

As we celebrate Christmas, may we learn from the simplicity of Mary and Joseph, and from the vulnerability of the Christ Child. May we open our hearts to those who are suffering, become bearers of peace, and choose love over indifference. May the humble birth of Jesus renew our faith and inspire us to build a world rooted in justice, humility, and hope. It is with great joy we acknowledge the goodness and the hard work of so many in different ways bringing life and growth to our Parish.
